David Brian Robertson Excellence in Leadership Award

Eligibility: Open to all current and former chapter leaders (see pp.2–3 for list). The recipient will receive a \$1,000 prize, plus \$1,000 to be awarded to their chapter for use in 2023-24.

Outstanding Chapter Award 2023

For the chapter leadership team that has demonstrated notable accomplishment this year through the collaborative engagement of its members in innovative chapter projects that advance the use of research to inform policy and strengthen democracy

Two awards will be given in this category: an **Outstanding Chapter Award** for established chapters and an **Emerging Chapter Award** for recently launched chapters.

Eligibility: Open to all current chapter leadership teams (see p.4 for list). Winning co-leaders will receive a prize of \$500 each, plus \$1,000 awarded to their chapter budget in 2023-24.

All chapter leadership teams will be automatically considered for this award based on their 2022-23 year-end chapter reports. Equally important, chapter members and affiliates are encouraged to submit short supporting testimonials—a few sentences describing how their chapter leaders supported and enhanced their experience as publicly engaged scholars.
